PARENT, STUDENT AND TEACHER SATISFACTION

Staff Satisfaction

Staff satisfaction has been measured using four sets of data.

- Staff Satisfaction Survey
- The Staff Attendance Records
- Staff interviews
- Fxit Interviews with Staff.

Using this collection of data, the College is able to determine that the Staff Satisfaction level continues to remain overall at a very high level. The Staff who are not teaching at DCC in 2021 have left DCC because of:

- A desire for teaching experience outside Melbourne & Victoria
- Career change
- Family circumstance change
- Transitioning to retirement.



Parent Satisfaction

Mindful of results gathered from parent surveying in 2019, as we faced into the emergent pandemic and all its challenges to community and educational continuity, we sought to further build healthy practices in our 'best practice areas', areas of Values and Culture, School Communication, Student Engagement, Teaching Standards, Curriculum, and Parent Engagement.

Anecdotal feedback, as well as online anonymous surveying each term, showed a higher degree of satisfaction as the year progressed, for most families - especially in the Primary years.

The College's records also indicate that almost 95% of new families come because of a direct referral from an existing family, 5% via the webpage and less than 1% from advertising. In most instances, when the webpage or advertising were the first point of contact, a family's initial impression of the College was supplemented by later contact with an existing family.

Student Satisfaction

Student feedback in 2020 was sought, during online lessons, each day through the student's class/form group period, and through teachers surveying students at the beginning or end of their daily classes. The answers helped modify our distance learning program 'in real time' as the College navigated over 112 days of government enforced lockdown.

Year 12s were specifically surveyed, on exit, around the following questions:

- What are your expectations of the school?
- What is your expectation of teachers, what do you want/need from them?
- How well do teachers at this school know their craft?
- How satisfied are you with the school?

Given the interrupted year, as well as missed opportunities, it was gratifying to hear stories of deep appreciation from our graduating class of 2021.
